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

Examples of LibGuides created by librarians collaborating with other departments:

Birth to 3 – Early Intervention

The Wegner Health Science Information Center (WHSIC) and the Birth to 3 Program, Center for Disabilities in Sioux Falls, created *Birth to 3 – Early Intervention* to highlight useful free library resources, and to promote important online resources and services to individuals and families interested in early intervention for children with developmental delays or disabilities. Links to online medical and community resources, suggested books and journals, infant and toddler activities, and more are found here.

The Birth to 3 Program and the WHSIC used the LibGuide to promote both agencies' resources at the April 18, 2016, Center for Disabilities public conference, "Symposium 2016: Connecting the Dots: Energizing People, Resources and Community" in Sioux Falls, and a May 25, 2016, meeting of the Sioux Falls School District for employees who work with early childhood issues.

The Birth to 3 Program and the Wegner Library will continue its collaborative work together using the LibGuide as a foundation for teaching, consulting, and promoting important disabilities resources. libguides.usd.edu/BirthTo3

Introducing Archival Research

Archives and Special Collections created an *Introduction to Archives Research* LibGuide and taught 3 sessions on archival research for Dr. Jing An's ELED 360 (K-8 Social Science Methods) research project on Clay County's fallen heroes. For this competition the School of Education and the Vermillion Veterans of Foreign Wars collaborated to engage education students in researching and writing about military veterans from Clay County with the best papers and presentation winning a cash prize. libguides.usd.edu/archiveresearch

Archives also collaborated with the National Music Museum (NMM) to exhibit three rare books from the Mahoney Music Collection as compliment to instruments held in the NMM collection (March-July 2016).

During the exhibition of the First Folio at the National Music Museum (March-April), the chair of the English department, Darlene Farabee, PhD collaborated with A&SC to create a complimentary exhibit "Shakespeare Illustrated" in the library. School groups and others on campus to view the first folio also visited the library exhibit.

New Archivist Welcomed in July 2015



Lisa Duncan began her work as the Archivist and Special Collections Librarian and throughout the year guided planning and moving of archival materials, while also increasing collaboration with other campus units.

Donations Expand Archival Collections

Twenty-eight collections were added into the Richardson Collection and University Archives during FY 2016—totaling 110 linear feet.

Collections acquired include photo albums of Veblen, SD, from Vivian Lucille Steen Anderson; additions to the Knutson papers, the Caroline Bowersox Collection of William Henry Jackson Photocroms, United Sioux Tribe papers, Crow Creek site papers, Marilyn Horst Collection of aerial photographs and an addition on Karl Wegner.

Most Used Resources

The Richardson Collection is made up of distinct manuscript collections focusing on South Dakota's cultural, political and economic history. Most used collections within the Richardson Collection:



Abourezk papers: items relating to James Abourezk's terms in the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate and materials relating to the Occupation of Wounded Knee in 1973.



Kneip papers: correspondence, departmental files, news clippings, etc., of the state's longest serving Democratic governor and youngest elected governor (1971-1978).



McFatridge papers: observations and descriptions of life from McFatridge's time teaching on the Rosebud Indian Reservation and being superintendent at the Winnebago Reservation in Nebraska.



Norbeck papers: correspondence, manuscript and print materials relating to Peter Norbeck's political service as governor of South Dakota and U.S. Senator.

Highlights of Collections Processed this Year

Gilbert Fite papers: Gilbert Fite was a professor of history who received his BA and MA from USD. He also published a biography on Governor Peter Norbeck. His papers include material related to his teaching and research career.





Wayne S. Knutson papers: Distinguished Professor Emeritus Wayne S. Knutson was a professor of Speech and Dramatic art, director of the university theatre, chair of the English department, dean of the College of Fine arts and vice president of Academic Affairs. The Knutson Papers contain photographs, programs, and other memorabilia from the 1939-1973 USD theatre seasons. Also included are box office final reports from 1939-1981.

Robert L. Slagle papers from Raleigh E. Baldwin and Gordon Aadland Correspondence with Al Neuharth: The Raleigh Baldwin addition to the USD President Robert L. Slagle papers includes correspondence, news clippings, photographs and a watch once owned by Slagle. This material was collected by Slagle's secretary Raleigh Baldwin and mostly concerns Slagle's illnesses and death.

During this October event, A&SC gained twitter followers, engaged with the public and got to know fellow archival institutions. Archives staff answered questions on everything from our favorite collections to how to preserve family photos. #AskAnArchivist Day is sponsored by the Society of American Archivists to raise awareness and understanding about archives and the archivist profession.

The Governor William Janklow Project



Twelve oral history interviews related to the Governor William Janklow Project were recorded, deposited, or had their transcripts completed at the SDOHC during FY 2015-16. These interviews complement the eight recordings of Janklow or Jankow-related interviews already cataloged and available at the SDOHC. The end of FY 2015-16 saw the

installation of Express Scribe transcription software at the SDOHC. Graduate assistant Chelsey Groseclose pioneered usage of the software, first using it in June 2016 to create a 43-page transcript of a press conference of Governor Jankow from April 3, 1986 (SDOHP 2244). The software has proven to be a valuable asset, and the hope is that it will allow for rapid transcription of many SDOHP and AIRP audio files in the coming year.

Photographs from A&SC have been used in publications and social media by the USD Foundation, USD Alumni Association, USD Marketing and South Dakota Historical Society Press.



PROVIDING ACCESS TO OTHER LIBRARIES' COLLECTIONS...



The University Libraries Interlibrary Loan (ILL) office provided USD students, faculty, staff and Wegner Partners access to 8,400 books and articles by requesting them from other libraries during FY 2016. In turn, 7,446 books and articles were lent through interlibrary loan to other libraries.

What other services does ILL provide?

We also provide access to our own materials through a service called Document Delivery. Last year document delivery services sent 5,317 books and articles to students (graduate, undergraduate and distance), faculty and staff from resources the University Libraries subscribes to or owns.

What is the most commonly requested item for Document Delivery?

Dissertations!

Who requests the most items through ILL?

Graduate students.

Probably because they do so much research for their programs.

What would be a typical turn-around time when requesting a book or article?

Books take, on average, one week to arrive. Most articles are delivered within 24 hours of requesting (excluding weekends and holidays).




